

**Carlos Heredia**, Economist, Mexico City



Carlos A. Heredia (Tampico, Mexico, 1956) is an economist and a former member of the Mexican Congress. A graduate of McGill University in Montréal, he has worked for almost 25 years with Mexican, U.S. and Canadian development NGOs on trade and economic integration, multilateral banks and immigration issues. He has taught at ITAM and at Tec de Monterrey, writes a weekly column for the Tampico edition of *Milenio*, and is a frequent commentator in several Mexican news media. Heredia has held senior positions at Mexico's Treasury Department and the Government of Mexico City. From 2003 to February 2008 he was Senior Advisor on International Affairs to Lázaro Cárdenas-Batel, Governor of the State of Michoacán. Heredia was part of the Independent Task Force on the Future of North America, sponsored by the Council on Foreign Relations, and a participant of the North American Forum. He also serves on the Board of the Foundation for Democracy, chaired by Cuauhtémoc Cárdenas, and on the Advisory Council of the Mexico Institute at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in Washington DC. Heredia is a founding member of the Mexican Council on Foreign Relations (Comexi) and served as its Vicepresident during 2003-2006. He is one of the twelve Mexican citizens who belong to the Trilateral Commission.
